

Even to someone who used to be an expatriate to the sweet potato-shaped Island, this four-day trip to Taichung had not failed to surprise and inspire, especially when it comes to its admirable recycling culture.

Taiwan's recycling culture is renowned in Asia, but I have never really dug into this area with a fine-tooth comb – until now. As the music blasted from vehicle speakers -Beethoven's "Fur Elise" in some neighborhoods signalling the approaching of garbage and recycling trucks, residents from different apartment buildings would quickly gather their wastes and dash to the street to personally dispose the trash they produced at home. The

question I had in mind was how did the citizens get used to this ritual?

The answer lies in their education. In our visit to one of the biggest and oldest schools in Taichung, we have witnessed admirable recycling culture and advances in technology, ranging from solar-powered showers, organic fertilizer machineries and manual water pumpers to simple division of wastes into plastic. paper and glass. In several of the schools visited, faucets in the water taps were set on a low level to limit the use of water for hands washing in the toilet. Students had science lessons in which they made different functional arts and crafts such as fans and lights, from recycled materials.

I was also quite awestruck by how skilful the carpenters were at the furniture rehabili-

tation centre in renewing pieces of table would be resurfaced and polished at the centre and can be resold again.

Although the culture of using a lot of plastic bags, wooden chopsticks and cardboard lunch boxes, rubber bands and plastic chopstick wrappers in overly-crowded night markets is a draw-back from all the efforts made in recycling, the conscience and spirit amongst the citizens are intact and supported by public policy incentives and behavioural

Hong Kong – well, good luck.


During the practice, Mr Richard taught us to perform the poem in some fun ways. That made me like the poem more! He always gave us positive comments to encourage us to do better.





"It is the **YWPS plane model**. It should be on the list of items as it is fun and can let us remember the "MILES" programme last year."




