prior knowledge of the sports and observation skills. There's no right or wrong but perhaps the most strategic way to win the game!

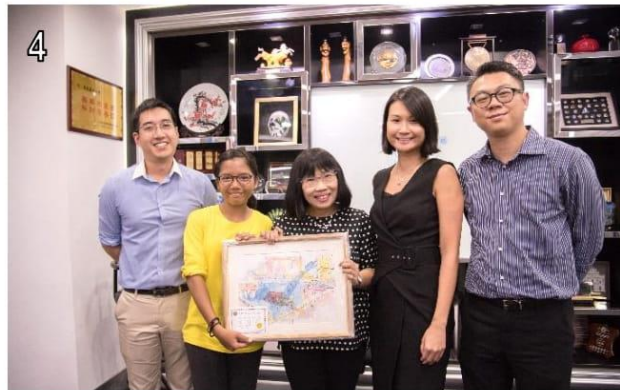

Public Speaking

Three Ying Wa Public Speaking Winners of different “generations” share their valuable tips on the arts.



Public speaking, different from a speech, is a two-way communication between the speaker and the listener. The speaker must catch listener’s attention, and clearly deliver the prepared content. The mission is to lead listeners to understand the material but not just finishing the script, and try to convince them on your point of view. No fancy wordings, no special phrasing, just a casual conversation with the listeners.

Hi, I am very glad to share with you some public speaking tips. Here are the three major points that I would like to highlight on.

1. Speak from your heart – it can allow you to project your points relatively more fluently.
2. Don’t fully rely on a script, create a plot and slowly find the best words that best fit the topic through practices.
3. Take the speech as a chat; don’t panic on stage. Speak like how you normally do. This will allow a more welcoming delivery.

Hopefully, these tips can help you all!

There are three things that are required for a good public speech. First, eye contact. Most audience will look away and do their own things if you’re looking at the floor or something else, or cue cards, which is related to my second point – don’t use cue cards. Even if you want to read from cards, look at the audience 95% of the time. Thirdly, and this was also the thing that I struggled with when I got into the world of public speaking, which is to be confident with your preparation and what you have written. Don’t let stage fright affect you! Give your best while on the stage as slipping a time or two is totally fine. It also gives the audience a great impression.

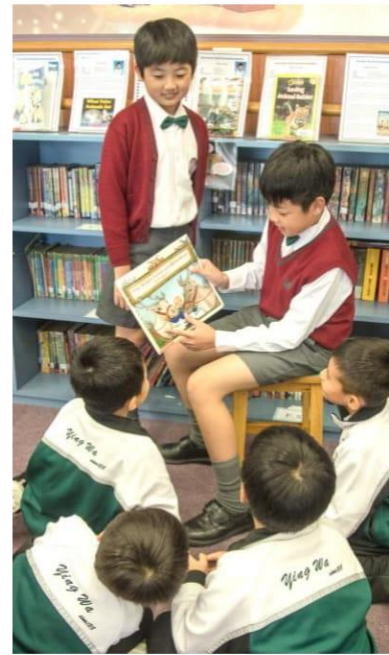

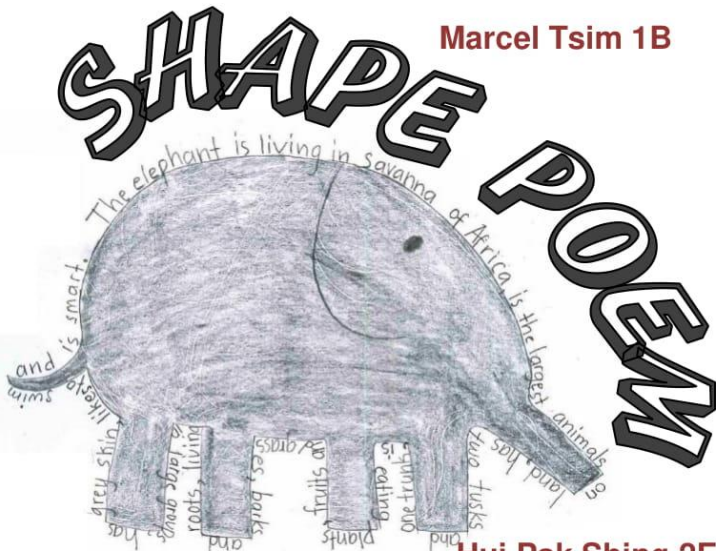

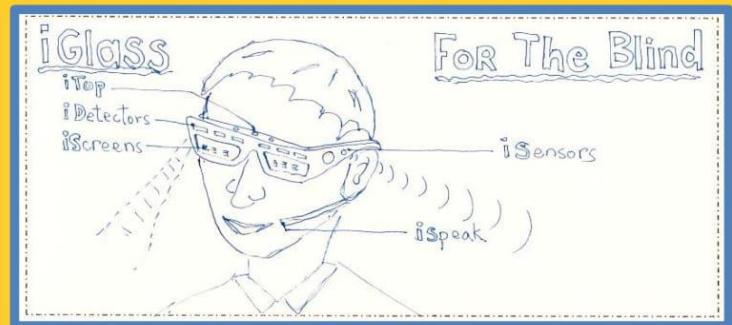

NEW GADGET



iGlass – The blind would like to use my gadget because it can let the person feel, observe, and hear the world differently and can use its top sensors to detect what the person is thinking and can communicate with other people.

iGlass is a pair of glasses which have a lot of electronic devices and other small parts on it.

The iTop is an ultrasonic sensor which can watch the area above, so when something falls down, a signal could be sent to the user.

The iDetectors and screens are on the glass. When the iDetectors know someone is coming, it can tell what the person wants to say.

The iSensors and iSpeak are also a combination. The iSensors can hear if something is detected by the iSensors. They can watch the ground whenever something they detect is blocking the person. Finally, iSpeak is a microphone for the person to say something loudly and clearly.
